Hope in friendships, family, loved ones and, most importantly, hope in Christ and all that we have in and through Him and His constant presence and love.

6. Your heroine, Tanner Shaw, works to combat human trafficking and continues to help victims make a new life for themselves in the aftermath. How does she handle combating such darkness and evil in the world?

I'm thrilled to be able to bring new characters and new settings to my readers in the coming years.
